

To Rita Martin, Foxboro's activities include everyone

If you happened to tune in to the Human Services/Jaycees auction on cable, the person welcoming you was Rita Martin, auction chairman, strong family person and enthusiastic teacher.

Rita is not new to the auction scene. The first year she served on the general committee. Last year saw her as part of the auction control team while this year she agreed to take on the arduous task of chairman, overseeing the whole event.

The auction is a place where no one comes with an agenda. In Rita's words, it is a "community affair where everyone is helping each other, where people from all . parts of the community come together with a common interest."

And as soon as the last item was auctioned, she and the volunteer team were already thinking of ways to make it a bigger and better auction next year. This is a change from the early days when the initial committee worried about having enough items to sell and enough people to sell them. New the issue becomes making it bigger and involving more members of the community.

And this same excitement for the community extends into her job as a reading teacher at the Parker Middle School in Taunton. Her eyes light up when she talks about children's books and the importance of reading.

Rita has a way of getting her students to read. Every Tuesday and Friday they devote part of the day to book sharing time. Sometimes the students talk about books; often they write in their journals, telling their teacher what they are reading or perhaps commenting on what they thought about their reading. Rita reads the journals and writes personal comments to each student to let them know she cares about what they were doing.

When she wanted a library in the back of her classroom where students could get books, as opposed to waiting every couple of weeks to go to the school library, she and her colleagues organized a book fair for the whole school to raise money and the library became a reality.

Rita also helps the students publish a 14-page school newspaper which comes out four times a year. Unlike a large daily, the newspaper is not backed by advertisements and still manages to have a 10 cent newstand price.

With the Valentine's Day issue, the students will be allowed to run ads at 50 cents an ad to advertise a message to a friend in the spirit of St. Valentine's Day. Profits from the paper are used for a field trip to the Brockton Enterprise newspaper plant where the children have a chance to see a large daily in operation.

"It's important to show enthusiasm," she says. "Have books around. Read to the children. Read to the children every day."

She also urges parents to have a wide variety of reading materials around so the child doesn't just think of a book as a "hard covered, dark colored book with pages in between."

On the home front Rita's husband Jack supports her in all her activities. He too, takes an active part in the community, having served on the Advisory Board and recently completed his work on the Growth Policy Committee. Jack also, in addition to being involved in family activities, is active in their church and was one of the original committee members to look into cable access when it was in its initial stages.

Their daughter, Karen, a sophomore at Foxboro High School, also volunteered at the auction. A good weekend or vacation time might find the whole family including David, a senior at Xavarian; and Kathy, a senior at the University of Connecticut - enjoying a hike, or camping at Mt. Kathadin in northern Maine. As members of the Appalachian Mountain Club, they have enjoyed spending time hiking in the Rockies and have placed on the agenda a possible trip to the Blue Ridge Mountains in the South:

And what is it that makes Foxboro different?

"I think it is a tone," she says. "All things are possible. No matter what the issue, people don't look at the negative but rather say 'let's see if we can do it'."

Rita welcomes the "What do you mean we can't do it?" attitude that prevails and causes people to "move out and try."

And to newcomers in the community, Rita advises Foxboro does not fit the "closed and cold" perception of New England towns. It is a place that "offers so many avenues to express individuality and interest." She says anyone new should check out the newspaper or school cable or Newcomers Club for it is a community "where no one is excluded.''

Foxboro just might scoop Mansfield's Jaycee title

competition between two local Jaycees chapters vying for bragging rights just might give the traditional Foxboro/Mansfield gridinon rivalry an entirely new twist.

These two chapters, located literally on each other's doorstep, are among the most successful in the entire state. And now, Foxboro is mounting a bid to challenge Mansfield's long-standing suprema-

"Mansfield has dominated first-place for quite a few years now," said Foxboro Jaycee president Glenn Shepardson, who joined the organization three years ago. "But we've got a lot going for us."

They sure do. It's been a good year for the Foxboro Jaycees. Last month, a local couple – Tim and Sue Kennedy – was named Massachusetts Jaycee "family of the year," and will take part in the national convention in Kentucky this June.

And at a statewide Jaycee convention held last weekend in Marlboro, the Foxboro chapter was

o, the Foxboro chapter was named the top local group in Massachusetts – a feat Shepardson termed "history making."

"Historically, Foxboro wouldn't even get into the top 10," Shepardson admitted sheepishly.

Ranking is decided on the basis of points accumulated in various areas of fund-raising and community involve-

JEFFREY PETERSON ment, and local chapters are judged on their performance in those areas.

Last weekend, Foxboro members Karen Mordaunt and Sandra Smith, and Shepardson's wife, Sandy, all were recognized for their role in specific service projects. Shepardson himself was honored with a "presidential award of honor," given to the top three presidents in the state.

The award, he conceded, sounds much more prestigious than it is.

Why the sudden turn-around? Shepardson contended the 30-year-old Foxboro chapter always has been involved in its share of community projects, but was less than dilligent about completing the necessary paperwork needed to get recognition.

"Let's just say that wasn't always our strongest

suit," he said.

No more. Now Shepardson personally compiles reports, documents projects and verifies the needs

of those individuals and groups who benefit from the Jaycees' help.

Some local projects — such as the annual pancake breakfast he. I each April (last year they served 1,200 people), the cable television auction and the Founders Day cookout — have become so well-established residents often forget the Jaycees are involved. Others are strictly one-shot deals — such as a November 1986 benefit basketball game held for Steve Brightman, a Foxboro police officer suffering terminal cancer.

Shepardson's personal favorite from the past year was "Concert on the Common," billed as a '50s-style rock n' roll party for all ages. The event was conceived to raise funds for the Kennedy-Donovan Center for handicapped children, which has a facility located in Foxboro. Unfortunately, a cold October drizzle put a damper on the turnout —but not on the enti-usiasm of youths from ithe Kennedy center who attended the festivities.

"It wasn't a large project but it was for a great cause," Shepardson caid. "Some of the kids from the school were there and it was really rewarding to see where our money was going."

Shepardson himself puts in about 20 hours every week. But with the current level of enthusiasm and Foxboro finally getting its share of recognition, he admitted it's been a heck of a lot more fun.

"It's just a good thing I've got an understanding wife," he said.

Incidental Motions

Motions of this group have few general characteristics in common, but for convenience have been grouped into one class. The name, "incidental," has been chosen because they arise only incidentally out of the business of the assembly.

See pages 10 and 11 for a Chart of Precedence of Motions and a Summary of Rules Governing Them.

PROGRESS OF MOTIONS

1. A member rises and addresses the presiding officer.

The presiding officer should be addressed by title, as "Mr. President." If the specific title is not known, it is always correct to use the term "Mr. (c 'adame) Chairman."

2. The member is recounized by the presiding officer.

The chairman recognized a member by his name, "Mr. Member" or by a nod to him. Having thus received formal recognition from the chairman, a member is said to "have the floor" and is the only member entitled to present or discuss a motion.

3. The member proposes a motion.

A motion is always introduced in the form, "I move that" followed by a statement of the proposal. This is the only correct phraseology. Aside from very brief explanatory remarks, it is not permissable to discuss the merits of a motion either prior to, or immediately following, the formal proposal of the motion. All discussion must wait until after the chairman has stated the motion to the assembly and has called for discussion.

4. Another member seconds the motion.

Another member, without rising or addressing the chairman, may say "I second the motion." Seconding a motion is merely an indication that the member seconding it wishes the matter to come before the assembly for consideration. If no one seconds the motion, the chairman may ask, "Is there a second to the motion." If there is none, he may declare, "The motion is lost for want of a second."

5. The presiding officer states the motion to the assembly.

When a motion has been properly proposed and seconded, the chairman repeats the motion to the assembly, or "states the motion." After it has been formally stated to the assembly, it may be spoken of as a "question," or a "measure."

6. The assembly discusses or debates the

After the motion has been formally stated by the chairman, any member has a right to discuss it. He must obtain the floor in the same manner as when presenting a motion. Normally the first person who asks recognition is entitled to speak, but when several members wish to speak or present motions at the same time, certain guiding principles should determine the decision of the chairman:

- a. The chairman should always show preference to the proposer of the motion.
- b. A member who has not spoken has prior claim over one who has already discussed the question, or who has proposed another motion.

c. If the chairman knows the opinions of the various members regarding the measure before the house, he should alternate between those favoring the measure and those opposing it.

- d. The chairman should recognize a member who seldom speaks in preference to one who frequently claims the attention of the assembly. DISCUSSION MUST BE CONFINED TO THE QUESTION THAT IS "BEFORE THE HOUSE."
- 7. The presiding officer takes the vote on the motion.

When all members who desire to discuss the question have done so, the chairman "puts the motion to a vote." He may, before taking the vote, inquire, "Is there any further discussion?" or "Are you ready for the question?" If no one rises, the chairman presumes discussion is closed. He will proceed to take the vote by announcing, "All in favor of the motion (STATE THE MOTION) say "Aye"." Following response from the assembly, the chairman then says, "Those opposed say "No"." If the chairman cannot determine from the volume of voices which way the majority has voted, he says:

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"The chair is in doubt. Those in favor of the motion please rise." After counting, he says: "Be seated. Those opposed, rise. Be seated." Another alternative is to simply call for a show of hands. Certain motions may be voted on by ballot.

8. The presiding officer announces the result of the vote.

The chairman formally announces the result of the vote, saying: "The motion is carried; therefore (STATE THE INTENT OF THE MOTION)." If a majority vote in the negative, "The motion is lost." As soon as the vote has been announced by the chairman, another motion is in order.

HOW MAY A MOTION BE AMENDED?

The purpose of the motion TO AMEND is to modify a motion that has already been presented in so had manner that it will be more satisfact. So the members,

Methods of Amending:

By addition or insertion

To add something to the motion which it did not contain.

By elimination or by striking out

To subtract or eliminate something from a motion that was originally a part of it.

By substitution

This method is a combination of the first two methods, since in amending by substitution something is stricken out and something inserted in its place. The substituted portion may consist of a word, a phrase, a clause, or an entirely new motion.

The most important principle to understand in connection with any form of the motion TO AMEND is that an amendment "MAY BE HOSTILE, BUT IT MUST BE GERMANE."

By "hostile" is meant opposed to the spirit and aim at the motion to which it is applied.

By "germane" is meant having direct bearing upon the subject matter or the motion; that is, relevant, or relating to it.

An amendment may be opposed to the actual intent of the original motion and, in fact, nullify it, but if it relates to the same subject matter, it is germane.

HOW TO HANDLE AMENDMENTS

Types of Amendments:

Amendment of the First Rank

An amendment to a motion.

Amendment of the Second Rank

An amendment to the amendment. (The amendment to the amendment must modify and relate directly to the amendment and NOT to the main motion, otherwise it is OUT OF ORDER.)

NO AMENDMENT BEYOND THAT OF SECOND RANK IS POSSIBLE. It is never in order to propose more than one amendment of each rank at one time. If one desires to amend two separate and unrelated parts of a motion, this must be done by two amendments of the first rank, and one must be voted upon before the other is proposed. It is possible, however, to have a motion, one amendment to the motion (amendment of the first rank), and one amendment to the amendment (amendment of the second rank) before the assembly at once. Until the amendment of the second rank has been voted upon, no other amendment of the second rank is in order. Until the amendment of the first rank has been voted upon, no other amendment of the first rank can be proposed.

Order of Voting:

Amendments are voted upon in inverse order; that is, the one of second rank is disposed of first.

- 1. Discussion is held and the vote taken upon the amendment to the amendment (amendment of second rank).
- 2. Discussion is called for and the vote is taken upon the amendment to the motion (amendment of first rank).
- 3. When the vote on this has been taken, discussion upon the original or main motion as amended is open and when completed a vote is taken upon it.

NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS

A nomination is the formal presentation to the assembly of the name of a candidate for the office to be filled.

Cable auction featured in 'how-to' book

By Pamela Braman

With only three years under its belt, the annual Foxboro cable auction is being featured in a book outlining ways non-profit organizations can successfully use cable television.

Author Margie Nicholson, formerly a cable television administrator in Chicago, said Foxboro Cable Access' coverage of the benefit auction is a remarkable use of cable technology for a nonprofit organization.

"In the calls I've made to about

40 access corporations throughout the country, I've only seen maybe one other example of such an auction, in California, and I don't know how successful it was," Nicholson said in a phone interview last week.

The auction, held Jan. 21 at the Ahern School, was sponsored by Foxboro Human Services and the Foxboro Jaycees, and netted almost \$10,000 for the benefit of FHS and the Foxboro Discretionary Fund. It is the third year that the auction has been held, and

was broadcast live over the local cable channel to several surrounding towns.

Nicholson said the time-consuming planning and preparation put into the production by its sponsors was in itself noteworthy. But she said Foxboro is fortunate in being able to raise funds via its local access channel. Many towns have provisions against using their station to raise any funds, she said.

Nicholson said she decided to

use the Foxboro auction as a chapter in her book after starting to make calls around the country last fall, searching for good case-studies to highlight. As part of an ongoing search to raise funds, non-profit groups need to learn effective ways of utilizing today's media technology, she said.

gy, she said.

"When I heard about Foxboro's auction, I thought it would be an ideal example of what non-profits can do," she said. "In your town, the auction is not only a main event, but it actually raises money."

Nicholson's book, now in its second draft, will be published by the Benton Foundation in Washington D.C., hopefully in the spring. After publication, it will be distributed at low cost to non-profit organizations and cable access companies throughout the country.





Foxboro Jaycees keep up with a brisk business at annual pancake breakfast

Nearly 1,500 hungry patrons had the right idea Sunday morning, skipping the home cooking and flocking instead to the annual Jaycees pancake breakfast.

According to Jaycees member Fred Badger the 2,015 tickets sold and the 1,450 meals served were records for the popular fundraiser. Badger said the event grossed \$5,988. Of this, he added, approximately \$4,000 would be turned over to the town's CYO basketball program.

Bleary-eyed work crews arrived as early as 6 a.m. at the high school cafeteria, to fire up the grills and make sure everything was organized.

Doors opened at 7:30 a.m., and numbers at the cafeteria quickly began to swell. At one point, said

Jaycee member John Zarrella, crowds were lined up 30 feet deep in an outside hallway waiting for a seat.

Jaycee members, helped by Jaycee women, would-be basketball stars and other youthful volunteers worked feverishly to keep up the pace. Youngsters waited on tables, refilled orange juice and milk cups and cleaned up afterwards.

"I'd guess we served probably 200 more meals than we've ever served before," Badger said: "It got pretty hectic for a while."

Before the last stuffed stragglers left the high school at about 12:30 p.m., Jaycees had used 310 pounds of pancake batter, 400 pounds of sausage, 47 gallons of orange juice, 22 pounds of coffee and some 600 half-pints of milk.



Foxboro batter a hit for CYO basketball

FOXBORO - Approximately 310 pounds of pancake batter, 400 pounds of sausage, 47 gallons of orange juice, 22 pounds of coffee and 600 half-pint cartons of milk were gone before the 16th annual Jaycees pancake breakfast stopped serving at noon Sunday.

The high school cafeteria was filled to capacity with pancake fans, eagerly toting pancake and sausage-laden plates back to their seats to benefit the CYO Youth Basketball Program.

Jaycees, Jaycee women, CYO basketball players and other volunteers worked behind the counter turning out pancakes by the thousands to accommodate the never-ending sea of hungry faces that traveled through the line.

At one point, volunteers were sent on an emergency mission to replenish depleted supplies.

"We probably served maybe 200 more meals than we have in the past," said Jaycee member Fred Badger.

Badger said 2,015 tickets were sold for the event and that approximately 1,450 meals were served.

"It cuts the cost for each child in half," said Jaycee member John Zarrella. "Every dollar and profit goes to offset the cost of the program."

Badger estimated that of the \$5,988 raised from the event, after all of the expenses have been paid, the Jaycees should be able to turn over \$4,000 to the CYO basketball program.

Badger said that in the past, there would be a peak busy period for the breakfast that would last approximately 1-14 hours, but that this year they had a streak that kept them all working straight through a 24-hour peri"It's a lot of work, but it's like a

social event for the Jaycees," said Badger, explaining that the members enjoy holding the break-

Badger said that the day began at 6 a.m. for some of the members, who came in early to fire up the grills and get the coffee brew-

Zarella said some of the work had to be started on Friday and Saturday in order to have every-

thing ready on time.

Badger said the event is organized by a committee within the Jaycees that coordinates the different aspects of holding such an event, such as publicity, manpower and food and supplies.

The Jaycees did a human services auction fund-raiser in January and also took part in the haunted house fund-raiser to benefit Wrentham State School.
