



Jaycees stoke fires for barbecue

It's time to put away the maple syrup and bring on the barbecue sauce. The Foxboro Jaycees, having just completed their most successful Pancake Breakfast in sixteen years, have started planning the Founders Day Barbecue.

This year's event will be their second chicken barbecue in as many years. Last year they served over 700 chicken dinners and about 200 hot dog dinners. This year they are anticipating a much bigger crowd. According to project chairman Pat Washburn, a new layout will improve efficiency this time around. "Our biggest concern this year is to keep the line moving," Washburn says. "We will have more grills this year and two complete serving stations to keep things moving."


Proceeds of the barbecue go



INDIVIDUAL DEVELOPMENT: Volleyball was canceled this week for lack of players.

Fences and Benches II: Tom Sawran passed out plans and spoke (at length) of the need of the Burill and Taylor schools for backstops and fences. Much money already donated for this project and with some money and manpower from us it can be completed. work planned for Sat. and Sun. 5/12-5/13. A motion for 500 dollar appropriation was seconded and accepted.

Mother's Day Essays: Gordon Snow reports that there were two winners in the contest from the Taylor School and two from the Burrill. Photo should be in the next Reporter.

The CYO Banquet took place recently and some nice words were spoken for the Jaycees. They are very appreciative for our effort with the Pancake Breakfast.
