

The Foxboro Jaycees take a pilgrimage of their own every Christmas season. The trek begins in the boarded-up school building on the corner of South and West streets, where the life-size, plaster statues of infant Jesus, Mary, Joseph and other nativity figures are stored on wooden pallets. It ends on the Foxboro Common, where the bandstand is transformed into a creche.

Watched by local children Saturday afternoon, Jaycees president Tim Kennedy, Rick Perry and Bob Webster lifted statues weighing up to 200 pounds from the back of a van and gingerly placed them in the manger. They hung an angel on the back wall, scattered hay, and erected a small fence.

The Jaycees continue their holiday season work with a Santa on the Common event for the Discretionary Fund near the manger 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday, Dec. 15.

Visiting Santa is free, but people are encouraged to bring money, canned goods or wrapped presents for the Discretionary Fund. Presents should be labeled to indicate the gender and age range for which the gift would be appropriate.

An open letter to the people of Foxboro from Santa

Thank you, volunteers of Foxboro. Your generosity and caring made my trip to your

town so much easier this year.

More people turned to me for help this year than ever before, and I just couldn't do everything by myself. More than 80 children received new clothes and toys under the tree at Christmas through my friends at the Foxboro Discretionary Fund. I heard the children's cries of delight and saw the tears of joy shed by their parents at the sight, and it reminded me once again of the real meaning of Christmas.

All this never would have been possible without the help and caring of many, many

Kathy Kilroy and her family, joined by members of The Women of Today (better known as the Jaycee Wives) spent days and weeks looking over my lists, checking sizes, shopping (and wrapping) for the dozens of families who needed a little boost this time

Raschel Gray and her staff outdid themselves once again, donating thousands of dollars worth of new clothes so the kids on my list will be warm and well-dressed when they return to school. And knowing how kids like surprises, they even included some lovely stuffed toys for added enjoyment.

That shiny new bicycle, donated by my friends at Foxboro Photo, generated a lot of

money for charitable projects, thanks to Carl Kusch who took charge of ticket sales.

And I will always be grateful to the Gibson family and their many helpers for the first annual Discretionary Fund Dinner Dance. The folks at the End Zone and Taylor Rental, as well as many other merchants, donated most of the necessities, everyone seemed to have a great time, and the money raised will go a long way to help with fuel or utility costs for families caught up in the economic problems that have affected so many.

The people at Saint Mark's Church, the Eldergram Association and Red Cross made and filled almost 100 stockings for the

moms, dads and kids on my list. The Girl Scouts in Troop 924, led by Janet Beaverstock, donated many rolls of wrapping paper, boxes and their precious time to wrap presents for the many families I wanted to visit on Christmas Eve.

The children at Burrell and Taylor Schools hung Christmas stockings on their doors, and filled them with money, donating almost \$800 to the Discretionary Fund, all of which is used to help Foxboro people during difficult times. And the children donated many boxes of food for the baskets that were delivered. And at Foxboro High School, the National Honor Society "adopted" a family, doing all the shopping for toys and clothes, and all the homerooms were in spirited competition, "buying" links for paper chains that would encircle their rooms, each trying to raise the most money for worthy causes.

Many families, some of them on limited budgets themselves, shopped for other families, making Christmas merrier for people they would never get to meet, but knew they were in need, and wanted to do something about it. Their sharing made me

feel real good.

Beatrice Nadeau and Dot Codding knit year-round, donating such beautiful sweaters, afghans, scarves and mittens to people that appreciate them very much. Rose Horvath made the holiday sweeter by donating homemade chocolate lollipops. Mike Eisenhauer donated the proceeds of a plumbing job so one child on my list would have toys and clothes for Christmas and his wife Maria stitched dressed, bibs and aprons, and I thank them so much for

Canisters were donated to the cause, and willing merchants and businesses allowed volunteers to place them next to their cash registers to make it easy for those willing to share. Special thanks to Mike and Michael Messina who designed the canister inserts and assembled almost 300 units. Jerry Rodman handled distribution and I am particularly grateful to all of those who were so generous, especially the two young girls who went to the Foxboro Reporter office and emptied their piggy bank into the canister so someone else could enjoy the holiday. They certainly are an inspiration.

People at Bethany Church and Saint Mark's, as well as students in each of the schools and the employees of The Foxboro Company all donated nonperishable food which helped so many families. At the post office, employees organized a drop-off place where food and new toys could be donated for the Discretionary Fund and many of the workers were generous donors as well. I want Laurie Goddard to know it was a great idea, and many teen-agers appreciated the gift certificates they provided.

I had a great visit when the Jaycees invited me to appear on the Foxboro Common. It gave me a chance to hear firsthand what many children wanted for Christmas, and they in turn were generous in donating food and gifts for the Discretionary Fund. We all had a grand time.

Food baskets, including all the fixings for a holiday dinner, were distributed by the Discretionary Fund to nearly 40 families at

Thanksgiving and to 51 of them at Christmas. Saint Mark's Church was a beehive of activity while things were being prepared by volunteers from Saint Mark's, Bethany. St. Mary's and from the community at large. Even whole families showed up to help. The Newcomers Club did the sorting. and I am extremely grateful to Barbara Benson, who keeps the Food Pantry orderly and well-stocked, and to Jack Authelet, who organizes the food program with the help of a small army of volunteers who spend one night packing (in boxes donated by Rea-Craft Press) and a second night reaching out to people in need in every corner of the community. All the nonperishable food is donated, all the work is volunteer, and the food distribution is part of the safety net sustaining families 365 days each and every

With more than 80 children on the list for Christmas toys and clothing, even Santa had problems with the packing. So Bot Kilroy, assisted by Lorraine and Stan Gar land, could be spotted all through the towr just before Christmas, checking all the dumpsters for discarded boxes that could be filled with presents. They returned jus

in time to help pack my sleigh.

All the shopping and wrapping had been completed (as we know it must be before Christmas Eve), a massive undertaking headed by Sue Messina, Santa's Foxbore coordinator. Making a list and checking i twice (a trick she learned from me) while making hundreds of calls, checking needs sizes and worrying over every detail, sh found many helping hands including Paau line Brown, Lorraine Garland and th Kilroy family, each of them one of m special helpers. They had everything read when yet another group of volunteers as rived, giving up their own Christmas Ev for the joy of helping others.

Once my sleigh was loaded, they were of again to every corner of the communit

with huge boxes filled with warm coat hats and mittens, school clothes and part dresses, topped off with toys certain bring many smiles and tears of joy a presents were opened on Christmas mor ing by some who, without help, would have had no presents.

It truly was a Merry Christmas in Fo boro, not only for those who received, b especially for those who gave in so ma





The Ways & Means Vice President is responsible for defining and coordinating chapter or community fundraising projects.


- 1) Attend all GM and board meetings



Cable volunteers honored

Seed money to ensure scholarship will be maintained

Some viewers may take for granted those volunteers who produce Foxboro Cable Access shows and run the cameras at school atheletic games, plays, concerts and countless governmental meetings.

But the organization does not take its volunteers for granted, and host of them were honored during the FCA annual meeting and awards ceremony Saturday night.

Highlighting the evening, a scholarship program and an arts enrichment fund were formally established.

FCA traditionally awards a \$1,000 scholarship each year to a Foxboro High School graduate planning to major in communication, but this year \$25,000 in seed money will insure that the scholarship is permanent, said Malcolm Beaverstock, chairman of the board and president of FCA.

The interest on a \$20,000 fund established Saturday will aid various arts projects in Foxboro.

The goal of the FCA enrichment

fund is to subsidize a project or performance by individuals or organizations for the enrichment of the local community.

Guidelines and applications will be available in mid-February at the Town Hall or at the FCA office at 131 Main St.

Applications are to be returned by March 31 in person or mailed to FCA, Box 524, Foxboro. Interviews will follow and the awards will be announced in May. (Call FCA at 543-4757 with any questions.)

The annual meeting Saturday was organized by Marge Nash and dedicated to her son, former FCA volunteer/producer Jon Oliver Nash, and to the other U.S. servicemen and women engaged in the war in the Middle East. A Navy Petty Officer 3rd class, Nash is currently serving aboard the carrier USS Saratoga.

FCA is a non-profit organization staffed by volunteers.

Marc Altman, a 1989 graduate of Foxboro High School, and William Grieder, treasurer and cameraman, were named volunteers of the year.

Grieder was also named director of the year for his work on the fourth annual Foxboro Jaycees/Human Services cable auction last week.

Beaverstock was named producer of the year for his production of numerous athletic games and school plays and music performances.

Other award winners in various categories were: Michael Coppola, Mark Linde, Dean Toepfer, Dick Leggee, Frank MacDow, Bob Rossetti, the FCA video club, Paul Beck, Bill Milhomme, Greg Carter, David Gulya, Jack Authelet, Jim Swift and Linda Roop.

"It was an upbeat night for everyone, a night to thank them for their efforts," Beaverstock said.

The meeting also set the 1991 FCA budget of \$84,000, which comes through a grant from Massachusetts Cablevision in keeping with its contractual obligation to provide 5 percent of its revenue to the local access organization.

Another auction success

Tough sell against Gulf war, football

From pet neutering to shrub fertilization, from stained glass to unstaining silverware, from a plane ride to a bird seed bucket, nearly 200 items or services were purchased Sunday during the televised fourth annual Foxboro Jaycees/Human Services auction.

While competing for viewers with war news and football playoffs, the auction reaped about \$8,800, according to chairman Rita Martin.

Most of the money goes to Foxboro Human Services, with the Jaycees giving their share to the Discretionary Fund, a year-round private source of emergency relief for local residents.

As of last Thursday, individuals and businesses had donated 164 goods or services with a retail value of \$13,000, according to Glenn Shepardson, Jaycees chairman of the board.

The items, still coming through Saturday, were sold at the Ahern Middle School in a cable TV auction reaching 17 area communities. Buyers phoned in their bids in a manner reminiscent of the better-known Channel 2 auction.

"Between the football games and the bombing in the Middle East, we did very well," said Martin, adding that the poor economy was another obstacle.

Martin, serving as chairman for the second consecutive year, said the high number of items donated helped keep this year's earnings on a par with last year's \$9,600 net.

The event was planned for months.

About 150 volunteers participated, manning phones, running the cable TV system, handling goods, and serving as auctioneers.

The set was erected at the Ahern School on Saturday and cable volunteer Marcus Moore slept overnight in the cable access van to prevent vandalism or theft.

Event during the auction, current events never strayed far from the minds of participants, and frequently during the afternoon volunteers stole a few moments from the

"It was wonderful," Martin said of the auction. "Our volunteers keep coming back and we had a wonderful time. Anything we get is more than we had before, so we're very happy."







4) Insure that chapter P.O. Box rental is paid prior to October 1 of the year


5) File documentation to renew tax exempt status annually

ot a lobster bake for 75 planned? Get ready to bid. Foxboro Jaycees and Foxboro Human Services are sharing the gavel for the fourth consecutive year next month when a bounty of community donations goes on the auction block to raise \$15,000 for community services.

The auction offers a staggering array of items from the practical smoke detectors and extinguishers courtesy of the town fire department to the evenings on the town, the airplane ride out of Mansfield Airport, and the rental of a cooker large enough to bake up 75 lobsters.

Raising \$15,000 will mean Foxboro Human Services "can get through to the end of the fiscal year feeling good," said McKenney, the agency director.

The fiscal year ends June 30.

This fourth annual cable auction will be broadcast on Mass Cable Vision 11 to 17 towns. They are Ashland, Bellingham, Bridgewater, Canton, Dover, Foxboro, Hopedale, Holliston, Mansfield, Medfield, Medway, Mendon, Norfolk, Seekonk, Sharon, Walpole and Wrentham.

"I think one of the nicest things is that it has become quite a community event," said McKenney.

This important fund-raiser will be held Jan. 20 from 2 to 7 p.m. The preview showing is Saturday, Jan. 19 from 1 to 5 p.m. at Ahern Middle School on Mechanic Street in Foxboro, at which time early-



bird bids will be accepted. This year's theme is "We're In This Together" reflecting the need for the community and human service providers to ensure that those in need get help. Proceeds fund the human service agency

and the Foxboro Discretionary Fund.

The sponsors are shooting for \$15,000 and hopes the community will be as open-hearted this year as in the past. Last year about \$10,000 was raised. This year state, federal and town cutbacks are pinching Foxboro enough to make residents yell "Youch."

Foxboro Human Services lends a hand to many surrounding communities, through such services as support groups for families of Alzheimer's victims, a senior day care for the elderly and counseling for adults and children who abuse drugs or alcohol.

Foxboro cable access filming will be done at no cost by the volunteer component, said McKenney.

Anyone who has already donated an item with retail value of \$500 or more has won a free 30-second video-tape commercial to run during the auction. The items will be pre-taped if donors call the above number for details.

"We do this auction in collaboration with the Jaycees. When we first got the idea we knew we did not have enough bodies to do this alone. We approached the Jaycees. We take two-thirds of the profit and the Jaycees take one third, of which some is donated to the town's discretionary fund," said McKenney.

Foxboro Human Services uses its portion to fund

ongoing services to residents.

"I think one of the nicest things is that it has become quite a community event. We need 100 volunteers the day of the auction. The Jaycee Women of Foxboro man the phones, and others work the boards. Quite a variety of people do the auctioneering for us. We have representatives from politicians to fire, police, school representatives good old community people. People who think highly of our organization and want to help us," said McKenney. "We are very fortunate we have plenty of help. And people in the community are very excited about it.

The auction proceeds will augment regular fund-

"We've certainly had some cuts we're dealing had cuthacks. with. The adult social day care has had cutbacks. And they're just not a lot of funds out there to apply for. A lot of programs have to get their own funding," said McKenney.

They'd like to raise enough money so some clients who have been cut back from three days of day care to only one can be sustained for additional days. The program, in which 23 persons are now registered, is funded by the state and federal



government.

For some families, like those with a member who has Alzheimers the day pro gram provide: respite. For oth ers, it delay: nursing home placement.

Total worth of items donat ed through yes

terday was \$4,500, said McKenney.

They include a gourmet dinner; an outdoor shed; paintings by community artists; several overnights at local inns; tickets to Great Woods and Tri-Borc theater; gift certificates to beauty salons; wrist watches; six months of basic cable service; pet neutering; pen and ink sketches of homes; gift certificates for landscaping; repair or refinishing of silverware; hand made afghans.

For two dollars, a bidder gains access to a special speed-dial number for quick bidding. Those bidders will need only provide indentifying information once.

After that, your password is your number.

"Most important, not only do we raise money, but it's become a great community project," said McKenney. In fact, clients to the human service agency have sometimes been attracted to services after viewing the auction, she said.

CYO basketball is a non-denominational program that gives hundreds of kids, ages eight to 16, an opportunity to play and learn together. And the program does not burden the taxpayers.


Each year, more than 50 coaches volunteer their 2





Sponsored by Foxboro Jaycees and moderated by local historian Richard Leggee, the forum marked the beginning of the homestretch for those

seeking office in the annual town election May 6.

Participants included selectman candidates Cheryl Darlington and James Evans Jr., Planning Board hopefuls John Sheehan Jr. and Robert Scott, Board of Health contestants Harold "Thomas" Avery and Thomas McGowan III and William Connelly Sr., who is seeking election as a trustee of Boyden Library.

Commanding the most attention, Evans and Darlington opened the forum by spelling out their background and qualifications for the selectman's job.

"All I want to do is share some of the experience I've gained in the past six years as an employee and as a volunteer," Darlington said in a prepared statement.

Evans identified as the single overriding problem facing the town an existing shortfall in revenue that he said must be dealt with by applying "sound management principles" to the budget process.

FOXBORO — Cheryl Darlington and James Evans, Jr., both candidates for the seat being vacated by Selectman Michael DeCenzo, Wednesday presented opposing viewpoints at the Jaycees' Candidates' Night concerning ballot Question 2, which asks voters to support the creation of a centralized municipal finance department.

Jeffrey Peterson, managing editor of *The* Foxboro Reporter, and Juliet Pennington of *The* Sun Chronicle, posed questions to candidates,



each of whom had to limit their responses to two minutes, during the two-hour forum moderated by Dick Leggee and televised by Foxboro Cable Access.

Darlington, an incumbent planning board member, expressed doubts concerning the necessity of the structural reforms called for by Question 2, as well as over the completeness of the proposal.

"Some of the pieces are missing," she said. "I'd

like to see more than just a few pieces."

Evans, however, voiced his support. "As a \$20-million town, it's important to have fiscal management in the hands of professionals," he said. "This is the first step in putting the fiscal house in order."

In response to a question from Pennington regarding the fairness of teacher raises in light of the town's current financial situation and the school department's request for a \$390,000 override of Proposition 2½, Evans and Darlington both said

they would vote for the override.

While crediting teachers and school committee members with trying to follow guidelines. Darlington said negotiators should have dealt with the financial situation appropriately when they knew there would be no money.

Political newcomer Evans also supported the

school department override.

"A contract is a contract," he said. "As a selectman, I don't believe I would ever encourage someone to break a contract. I don't believe we should balance our budget on the backs of employees."

However, he emphasized that depending on an override to solve budget problems was not a good idea. "We've got to look at good management controls," Evans said. "But the best way to protect our assets in this fiscal year is with the override."

Darlington also favored the override for recy-

cling

"The fee (\$14 per year) is minor," she said.

When asked if elected officials should be entitled to health-insurance benefits from the town, both candidates responded negatively.

Darlington said that health care was not to be expected "unless you are a salaried employee."

She mentioned that her knowledge of zoning bylaws and the daily events at town hall would help her, as a selectman, "to bring a little more communication" and "to make it easier to negotiate through the times coming up."

Evans, in turn, felt that his educational background in finance, his teaching experience and his 10 years of management consulting would be assets to

the town if he were selectman.




JUNE 1991


New Membership - L. Brennan

First of all I would like to let all the Jaycees know I am overwhelmed, confused, and anticipating a very successful year as VP of Membership.



Question 2, which called for the creation of a municipal finance department, was
