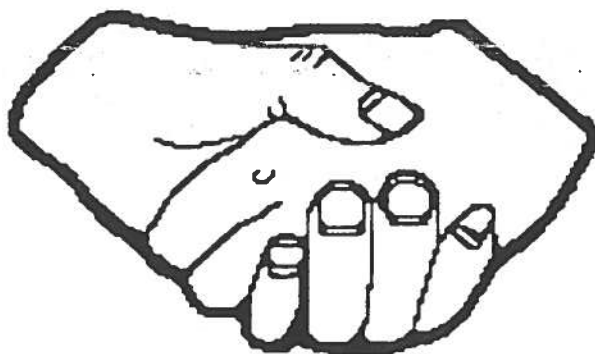

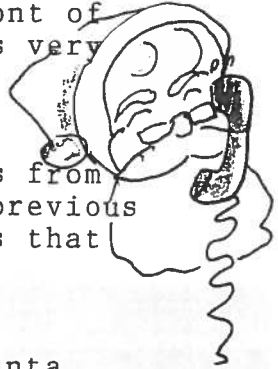
however, this year's holiday visit was hastily moved to drier quarters at the fire station when Saturday turned out rainy.

January 1992



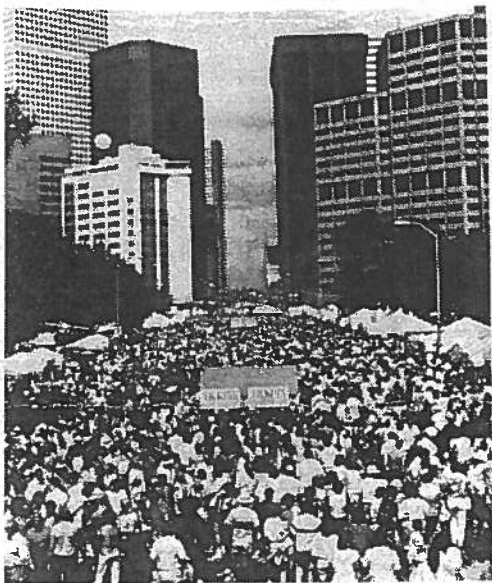

"A Taste of Massachusetts™" (TOM), a project of the Boston Jaycees, is a planned annual taste/music/art festival that will hold its first event Thursday through Monday, Labor Day Weekend 1992. Net proceeds, through the Boston Jaycees Charitable and Educational Trust (a 501-c3), will primarily benefit organizations that combat hunger and homelessness. 5% of net proceeds will go to Camp Lincoln Hill. Each Massachusetts Jaycee chapter will receive a portion of the net proceeds based upon membership and participation criteria.

Festival Events Hired

Boston, MA — The Boston Jaycees, after months of searching and negotiating, entered into an agreement with Festival Events, Inc. of Milwaukee - a division of Ringling Bros., Inc. "A Taste Of Massachusetts™" (TOM) project chairman Philip Erlanger said "Just to get to this point took the hard work of many individuals, including Boston and Massachusetts Jaycees, the Massachusetts Jaycees Headquarters Trust, the kind people from the Haymarket Bank, the City of Boston, and the people at Festival Events."

The agreement became possible once the line of credit at the Haymarket Bank was established. "The Haymarket Bank and the law firm of Aloisi & Aloisi bent over backwards to make this happen," Erlanger said. "The cooperation of the Mass. Jaycees Headquarters Trust, most notably with the help of Jim Calder, Lee Williams, and Jean Hudson, were much appreciated."

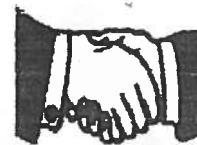


