"It will be an all-Foxboro affair," said the 27-year-old Poirier.


Daughter of Arthur and Carol Poirier of Gilmore Street, she is an administrative assistant at Wellfleet Communications in Billerica.

Like many a love affair, this wasn't love at first sight. Not for Poirier, at least.


As members of the Foxboro Jaycees, they crossed paths two years ago at the haunted house wrapup meeting.

Ghouls, goblins and ghosts are all for a good cause

OXBORO — Dave Brown is waiting for his shipment of skulls, wondering out loud where the delivery van is. A volunteer holding a disembodied limb in his hand jokes that he's seen the van parked over by the cemetery. "By the way," he calls after Brown, "I need some heads and parts."

"We buy body parts in bulk," says Jane Webster, walking up the subterranean tunnel towards the stairs that lead up to the auditorium. Brown follows, still worrying about his skulls. "If they're not here tomorrow..." He clenches his fists in imitation of the infamous

Mr. Hyde.

Foxboro residents, don't be alarmed. It's just the Foxboro Jaycees and their corps of volunteers up to their Halloween shenanigans again. They've been planning their annual Haunted House since early spring — so they can't be blamed for their ghoulish humor.

It's the fifth annual haunted house, raising funds to benefit local organizations and support the many community projects hosted by the Jaycees during the year. The house, which last year drew more than 9,100 shock-seeking visitors, will open this Friday and run through Oct. 31.

Brown, producer of the haunted show, says it may be the last one at the Foxboro State Hospital auditorium at Payson Road.

"The buildings are getting mothballed beginning next week," he said.

That means the buildings, built between the late 1800s and the 1940s, will be cleaned out and boarded up.

The extra work this year, he

said, was getting permission from the state Division of Capital Planning and Operations to use the building. Up until a few months ago, the buildings were controlled by the state Department of Mental Retardation, and it was a foregone conclusion in past years that the old auditorium and part of another building would host the haunted house.

Plenty of good causes

Webster, assistant producer of the haunted house, explained that the proceeds go towards haunted house expenses, donations, and Jaycees projects.

"Last year we grossed about \$40,000," she said.

After expenses, which each year include a required special detail police officer and firefighter, about \$25,000 was donated to the groups who volunteered in the haunted house project, the Jaycees projects fund and the Friends of the Wrentham State School.

"Our biggest donation is to the Friends of the state school," said Webster.

In past years, haunted house donations have allowed the state school group to purchase new therapy equipment for school clients, as well as other equipment and needs not met by the state's budget allowance for the facility.

Haunted house funds have also gone into the Foxboro Discretionary Fund, and Jaycees-sponsored projects such as Santa on the Common, Elders' Day, annual scholarships to graduating Foxboro seniors and youth sports. They have even gone towards the purchase of a video camera for the Foxboro Fire Department to use in arson investigations, said Brown.

The actual construction of this

year's haunted house began at the end of August. It usually takes six weeks to complete, but with 60 volunteers this year, "we're running ahead of schedule," said Brown.

The volunteer corps this year hails from organizations such as the Newcomers Club, the Blue Hills and Plainville Jaycees, Boy Scouts Troop 7, Cadet Girl Scouts Troop 839 and the high school.

For the first time, the haunted

house will carry a special theme — Olde England. Visitors may expect to find themselves wrapped in thick London fog, with Jack the Ripper peering from the shadows. Who knows?

The haunted house will open at 6:30 this Friday. It runs for 11 nights through October, but will be closed Oct. 17 through 20 and Oct. 25 and 26. Tickets are \$5 for Friday and Saturday shows, \$4 for all other nights. Parking is free.

Jaycees ready to scare you

Jack the Ripper is back!

That's right, the murderous fiend who killed seven women over a two-month span is back.

Jack is roaming the halls of the former Foxboro State Hospital as part of the annual Haunted House sponsored by the Foxboro. Canton and Planville Jaycees.

From the time you enter the lobby to when you leave through the English Countryside exhibit, you are in for a scare, producer Dave Brown promised.

In the lobby, as you await the 15-minute tour, you begin to learn about all seven of Jack the Ripper's murders.

You can read how Jack's first victim, Emma Elizabeth Smith, was too embarrassed to tell the police what happened and died the next day.

If she had told, police speculate, the other six murders might not have happened. Instead, Jack continued killing.

In between reading about Jack's exploits, there will be five televisions set up around the lobby, which seats 300, showing outakes of numerous horror films.

When it's time to go inside, hold on to your hat — that's when the excitment begins.

As you make your way down the dark hallways, you travel by 10 different exhibits set in the 1800s.

While walking through a set intended to give you the feeling of being in 19th-century England. you will witness a live re-enactment of Jack slicing the throat of one of his victims. After the murder, Jack takes off and runs toward you.

From there, you will walk into a parlor of King Henry VIII and watch the beheading of his wife.

The death theme continues as an English grave robber digs up a body in search of valuables.

One of the most interesting

next: the story of Sweeny Todd and his wife.

Sweeny was a barber who killed his clients by cutting their throats. Once the victim died, the body would be sent down to his wife who would make meat pies out of it.

In between rooms, you have to watch your step. There are barking dogs, cats lying in sewer runoff and skeletons that lunge forward. Visitors are led into the office of Dr. Jekyll as he makes a concoction that will turn him into his alter-ego, Mr. Hyde.

This is the first year that the Jaycees have had a "theme" for their haunted house, that being Olde England.

While designing this year's sets. Brown said he bought a book that gave ideas on how to build different set designs.

Brown said he would like to raise \$30,000 this year and hopes to attract more than 10,000 people. Last year, 9,100 visitors took the two-building tour and \$22,000 was raised. Part of the money raised goes toward the Friends of Wrentham State School.

The Jaycees also use the money for scholarships. a hazardous waste collection day in Canton, an Elders Day in Foxboro, and last year a donation of safety helmets was made to the Foxboro Little League. Boy Scouts Troop 7 and Girls Scouts Pack 848 will also benefit from the haunted house.

Those who helped this year were Jane Webster, Tom Sawran, Cheryl Cushman, Carl Bertolino
