They were cycling for a cause

Trio pedaled throughout the world to benefit the Jimmy Fund

When three well-worn riders atop three extremely well-worn bicy-cles pedaled into Waterfront Park a week ago Saturday, they were not only carrying the 60-pound backpacks that have accompanied them over 15,000 miles and six continents, but also the thoughts and good wish-es of the thousands of people whose lives they have touched along the way.

The Jaycees World Ride Against Cancer was the brainchild of 31vear-old Milton resident Richard Drorbaugh, who created it two years ago in order "to unite a global community that is committed to the end of cancer in our lifetime through forging collaborations among nations, industries and global citizens."

Drorbaugh, 35-year-old Arizona resident Jeffrey Ebert and 41-yearold Canadian Peter McIntyre began the trip June 19, 1993, in Boston. After that, the three traveled through 32 countries in North America, Europe, the Middle East, the Far East and South America. "The cancer knows no borders... it doesn't discriminate," said Drorbaugh. "The citizens of the world see this cause as a bond that crosses cultural lines."

The proceeds from the ride, which so far have topped \$22,000 and are continuing to flow in from around the globe, are being donated to the Jimmy Fund, the primary fund-raising arm of the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute.

"[The ride] is a very unique event," said Jane D'Arcy, the assistant director of the Jimmy Fund, "These three guys have given up a year of their lives and devoted it to spreading awareness of [the Dana-Farber] mission."

The sponsoring organization, the Massachusetts Jaycees, or which Drorbaugh is a member, was instrumental in the ride's success. It aided by donating \$17,500 to help cover the majority of the expenses and also by networking the fundraising to other Jaycee organizations in 110 countries. The Jaycees, a leadership development and community service organization, sponsored the riders in 90 percent of the countries they visited and provided them with items ranging from a bed to sleep on to a doctor to provide treatment upon the accidental intake of foreign tap water.

Each of the riders has been personally affected by the disease they rode 75 miles a day to fight. Drorbaugh's mother, father and grandmother died of cancer, his stepmother has lived with it for 25 years, and recently, one of his three older sisters developed precancerous cells. At the time of his mother's death when he was 6, the disease was hushed up in the Drorbaugh family and through most of the United States - rarly discussed among friends and almost never among strangers, a pattern the men see being repeated in many nations.

Drorbaugh believes that while the United States has become "much more comfortable talking about cancer" in the past 25 years, the disease ramains taboo in many nations. "World Ride has provided a platform throughout the world for people to talk about it," explained Drorbaugh, who said people came to the riders in hushed and almost embarrassed tones to discuss their experiences.

The three riders have reached the end of their journey, but the hope is that the attention they have brought to their cause and the bond they've created around the world will endure.
