#### Installation Banquet - Lynda Walsh - 5/4 - Rally Point



On Thursday, March 14, 2019, Book Club members congregated at the home of Lisa to enjoy Cauliflower crust pizza, cheesecake, tiramisu, fruit, cheese, crackers, and beverages to discuss Escape by Carolyn Jessop, who at eighteen years old, was coerced into an arranged marriage with a total stranger, Merril Jessop, a man 32 years older with three wives. Plural marriages were an integral part of the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints (FLDS), the radical offshoot of the Mormon Church that had settled in small communities along the Arizona-Utah border. Over the next 15 years, Carolyn had eight children and withstood Jessop's psychological abuse and the watchful eyes of his other wives who were locked in a constant battle for supremacy. But in 2003, Carolyn chose freedom over fear and fled her home with her eight children.

Book Club members discussed Carolyn's desire to attend school and learn. She became a teacher, found a group of friends with whom to confide, managed a business for the family, and finally fled with her eight children in the middle of the night with the help of her brother


who had also fled the group. We also admired her courage and ability to protect her children. She refused to leave without them.

Carolyn's story is a very detailed story to illustrate how long and painful those 15 years were. Her escape paved the way for other women to find their way to the Utah Attorney General who eventually brought down FDLS Leader Warren Jeffs, who is still in jail, and eventually, one of Merrill's wives was able to have Merrill prosecuted for sexual abuse. We found updated information that Carolyn has since married a nice man she met at a college, and her children are doing well. One daughter returned to FLDS and claimed her mother's allegations were not accurate, but her oldest son, now happily married, runs events to raise awareness for victims of polygamy.

On the rating scale with 1 being "drop everything, turn off the phone, and read," 2 being "good but leave the phone on," 3 being "glad I bought it and read it but not for everyone," 4 being "wish I had not purchased it and would not recommend it to others," and 5 being "wish I had not read it," the book earned mostly 2, 2.5's and a 3. We enjoyed the book, had rich

conversations about a range of great topic, and had a lovely evening filled with friendship and conversation. This very tough crowd gave this book respectable and positive marks and engaged in some fabulous conversation!

Looking ahead: **Thursday, April 4th at the home of Monica Rigamoti:** Tattooist of Auschwitz by Heather Morris: In April 1942, Lale Sokolov, a Slovakian Jew, is forcibly transported to the concentration camps at Auschwitz-Birkenau. When his captors discover that he speaks several languages, he is put to work as a Tätowierer (the German word for tattooist), tasked with permanently marking his fellow prisoners. Imprisoned for over two and a half years, Lale witnesses horrific atrocities and barbarism—but also incredible acts of bravery and compassion. Risking his own life, he uses his privileged position to exchange jewels and money from murdered Jews for food to keep his fellow prisoners alive.

### Who's Who?

Pam Warren's family moved to Franklin in 1975 when she was six years old. After graduating from Suffolk University on Beacon Hill, she then moved to Western New York to marry her high school sweetheart who had moved there with his family while she was in college. In the Fall of 2009 after a divorce, Pam returned to Franklin, where she now lives with and takes care of her mom who has Alzheimer's, her mom's husband John, and the family dog Blanca.

Pam assumes many hats with the Jaycees: how did she acquire such diverse talents? Pam has had MANY different jobs throughout her career – most in some form of customer service or sales. Pam worked for a small market, AM radio station in Batavia, New York, assuming various roles: advertising sales, news, ad production, office manager, scheduling and billing and even the afternoon DJ for several years. She has been an armored car guard / ATM Technician, a Driver's Ed instructor (not too stressful!!!), a mall greeter, a survey proctor, and most recently, a department manager in retail sales. She currently is an Uber driver and plans to do flea markets and craft shows this summer with her craft business – PJW Originals.

How did Pam find the Jaycees? Pam joined the Jaycees in 2001 in Batavia when the President of the local chapter and the project chairperson for their annual Home, Garden and Trade Show approached her radio station sales manager seeking help locating new vendors for the show. Pam encouraged SOME clients to purchase a booth for the show and assisted with the promotion, set-up and running of the show, and she hosted the live remote during the event for the station. When the Home Show was over, Pam and her colleagues were invited to a wrap-up meeting and all three were sworn in as Jaycees. Pam eventually joined the board in Batavia, serving as Secretary and Management Development VP and later serving at the State Level as Corporate Secretary / Presidential assistant for 7 different State Presidents, continuing even after she returned to MA. The New York Jaycees also took her to several National Conventions to compete in ID Competitions, including Speak-up, Write-up and Debate, and she was also a Judge at the Convention in Memphis, TN.

Pam returned to Massachusetts and sought the local chapter to continue her affiliation with this great organization, connecting with Vanessa Linke! Pam is happy to have found Jaycees family with the Foxboro Jaycees and enjoys her role on the board.



Pam cites that Summer Concerts on the Common as her favorite project: "I have run the concessions during the concerts for the last several years, and I truly enjoy coming out each week during the summer to hear some great music, hang out with friends and enjoy what is usually a pleasant evening out. Helping earn funds for the chapter is just an added bonus. I love that one of our projects can bring the whole community together week after week for something fun."

Pam is very proud of the Wise Fox: "I have edited it for the past two years (and will continue to do so next year) and have been working hard to make it something everyone looks forward to seeing each month. I do hope you all enjoy the pictures and find the information helpful!"

Pam shares her talents and passion for service in other

areas of the community. She is president of the Franklin Art Association, a group for artists and art lovers, holding monthly meetings during which artists give demonstrations and workshops in various media (Oil Paint, Pastels, Watercolors... Pam even did a jewelry-making workshop recently). The association also presents two annual art exhibits, offers a scholarship for a student who is going to art school, and has formed the "Metro-West Art Collective" with other art associations in the region, including the Foxboro Art Association, Stony Brook Camera Club, Rhode Island Watercolor Society and

others to share ideas and resources. Pam draws from her Jaycee experience to help with recruitment issues and event planning for the art association.

Pam lists her mom as her greatest source of inspiration. She instilled the value of Volunteerism in her at a young age, and Pam describes her as "one of the strongest women I know." Pam's mom got her involved in the Scouts as a kid, volunteered as a troop leader when one was needed, and was active in the community even while raising two kids mostly on her own.
