Dave Brown joined the Jaycees in 1985. He's remained true to the Chapter ever since. He's run many of our projects over the years, but his Chairmanship of the Haunted House was one of his proudest projects. He certainly loved the concerts on the common series and chaired that project as well. One of his latest projects was to order and install new Jaycee Signs around town. He also held many board positions.

Over the years Dave gained many friends within the chapter and if you were lucky enough to call him friend, you were blessed.

He enjoyed sharing time with so many of us on different levels. Maybe you went on one of his camping / hiking excursions, maybe you went to a concert with him, maybe you joined the team at trivia, or maybe you sat next to him at a meeting. You can be sure you enjoyed his company, always with a smile on his face and a thought to share about an idea for a new project or bringing an older project back.

Dave, as many of us, took his skills gained from the Jaycees and became involved with town government for many years, helping on the Zoning board.

Dave was a true Jaycee in every sense of the word and believed that service to humanity is the best work of life. In 1994 he was awarded the Jaycee Keyman award and was also given a Life Member award in 2002.

David John Brown passed away peacefully in his home on Monday, June 19, 2023.

A longtime resident of Foxboro, he is survived by his wife Carmela, his children Michael and Sandra, and his grandchildren, twins Zachary and Samantha. He is also survived by his stepchildren Michael, David, Michael and grandchildren Jared and James. He leaves behind his two dogs, Rebel and Rascal.

Dave was raised in Cranston, R.I., with brothers Gary and Douglas, and sister Donna. He graduated from Roger Williams College and pursued a long career as a safety professional with several major insurance companies.

Dave was active for many years with both the zoning board and the Jaycees in his hometown of Foxboro.

He enjoyed hiking, camping, live music, and traveling the world.




Book Club – Lisa Jolicoeur – July Meeting will be held on Thursday, 7/6 at Lisa's home.

In June Book Club members gathered at Sandy's home to discuss Sara Nisha Adams' "The Reading List" while enjoying delicious treats: crackers, cheese, olives, fresh strawberries and blueberries, pastry, tea, wine, and home made Merger Pudding right out of the oven with ice cream!

We loved this book set in Wembley, England and had lots to discuss! Eighty-year-old widower Mukesh and bright, anxious teenaged Aleisha interact over books but ultimately find a connection that helps each endure their painful challenges: he struggles to find his stride after losing his wife, and she suffers with a mentally ill mother, depressed brother, absent father, and an uncertain future.

Aleisha finds a crumpled-up book list in the back of *To Kill a Mockingbird*. It's a list of novels that she's never heard of before. Intrigued, and a little bored with her slow job at the library, she reads each book and is transported from the



painful realities she's facing at home. She shares the list with Mukesh and helps him find peace. Meanwhile, the list appears to other characters, and their little community grows. Book Club members shared titles that impacted them greatly: "I, Rigoberta Menchu: An Indian Woman in Guatemala," "A Tree Grows in Brooklyn," "Diary of Anne Frank," "Stones From the River," "Seven People You Meet in




Heaven," "The Shake," and "When Heaven and Earth Changed Places." We also discussed the books of the reading list and the ones we had and had not read. We all had read most of the books and enjoyed discussing them.

We discussed how books teach empathy as well as offer important lessons about history and culture; we loved how Adams made each book accessible without spoilers and allowed readers to grasp the human parts of the characters. Therefore, we gave the book mostly 1.5's and

a 1 on our new rating scale, which is as follows: 1 being "drop everything, turn off the phone, and read; no one should bother me until I am done; I might even be late for work; " 2 being "good, leave the phone on, recommend to my friends, not good enough to earn a 1 for a potential flaw, but worth reading"; 3 being "glad I bought it and read it, will talk to my book friends about it, but I am not recommending it to all my friends; 4 being "I regret paying money for the book, but it's tolerable if I didn't pay hard earned money for it"; and 5 being "I wish I had not read it and wasted precious hours of my life."

July Book Choice: "Tomorrow and Tomorrow and Tomorrow" by Gabrielle Zevin



From the best-selling author of *The Storied Life of A. J. Fikry*: On a bitter-cold day, in the December of his junior year at Harvard, Sam Masur exits a subway car and sees, amid the hordes of people waiting on the platform, Sadie Green. He calls her name. For a moment, she pretends she hasn't heard him, but then, she turns, and a game begins: a legendary collaboration that will launch them to stardom.

These friends, intimates since childhood, borrow money, beg favors, and, before even graduating college, they have created their first blockbuster, Ichigo. Overnight, the world is theirs. Not even twenty-five years old, Sam and Sadie are brilliant, successful, and rich, but these qualities won't protect them from their own creative ambitions or the betrayals of their hearts.

Spanning thirty years, from Cambridge, Massachusetts, to Venice Beach, California, and lands in between and far beyond, Gabrielle Zevin's "Tomorrow, and Tomorrow, and Tomorrow" examines the multifarious nature of identity, disability, failure, the redemptive possibilities in play, and above all, our need to connect: to be loved and to love.

August Book Choice: "Wrong Place, Wrong Time" by Gillian McAllister.

Late October. After midnight. You're waiting up for your eighteen-year-old son. He's past curfew. As you watch from the window, he emerges, and you realize he isn't alone: he's walking toward a man, and he's armed.


You can't believe it when you see him do it: your funny, happy teenage son, he kills a stranger, right there on the street outside your house. You don't know who. You don't know why. You only know your son is now in custody, his future shattered.

That night you fall asleep in despair. All is lost.

Until you wake . . .

. . . and it is yesterday.

And then you wake again . . .




. . . and it is the day before yesterday.

Every morning you wake up a day earlier, another day before the murder. With another chance to stop it. Somewhere in the past lies an answer. The trigger for this crime—and you don't have a choice but to find it . . .

September 7th Book Choice: "Hello Beautiful" by Ann Napolitano

William Waters grew up in a house silenced by tragedy, where his parents could hardly bear to look at him, much less love him—so when he meets the spirited and ambitious Julia Padavano in his freshman year of college, it's as if the world has lit up around him. With Julia comes her family, as she and her three sisters are inseparable: Sylvie, the family's dreamer, is happiest with her nose in a book; Cecelia is a free-spirited artist; and Emeline patiently takes care of them all. With



the Padavanos, William experiences a newfound contentment; every moment in their house is filled with loving chaos.

But then darkness from William's past surfaces, jeopardizing not only Julia's carefully orchestrated plans for their future, but the sisters' unshakeable devotion to one another. The result is a catastrophic family rift that changes their lives for generations. Will the loyalty that once rooted them be strong enough to draw them back together when it matters most?

An exquisite homage to Louisa May Alcott's timeless classic, *Little Women*, *Hello Beautiful* is a profoundly moving portrait of what is possible when we choose to love someone not in spite of who they are, but because of it.
