

Jack Authelet - In Memoriam

The Foxboro Jaycees -- past and present -- always knew we could count on Jack Authelet for anything. No one loved Foxboro more than Jack – no one – and he and his wife Marge were already making a difference in the community long before the Foxboro Jaycees arrived on the scene in 1961 and Jack continued to make that difference until his passing on September 18, 2023, just 8 days shy of his 91st birthday.

Jack's service to, and his love for, Foxboro would fill volumes. Newer members of the chapter may not know that Jack was an honorary Jaycee and listed on our roster as such for decades.

In speaking about the Foxboro Jaycees for the Cable Access Public Service Announcement Video, Jack said of the Foxboro Jaycees, "...In one word: ENERGY." He loved this group because our mission of community service was also HIS mission in life.

Many Jaycees are blessed that he called us "friend."

To so many of us, he was a mentor, and he was also one of the Jaycees' greatest cheerleaders, praising us publicly and, when we sought him out, advising and counseling us with his wisdom, or helping us solve a problem.

Jack's entire life was dedicated to others – his family first, and then the extended family of all of Foxboro – a very humble man who didn't want any credit, but would do anything to ensure things got done, that people were helped, the red tape cut, that the difference was made.

To any Jaycee who is seeking a role model, look no further than Jack. Jack was always on the front lines, doing God's work, and always encouraging others to do the same – living out the saying of doing all the good you can do for as long as you can do it.

A remarkable man. A remarkable life. A life of service and family so very well lived.

We have lost one of the best of us and will never forget the man who so embodied our creed that, "Service to Humanity is the best work of life."

The Foxboro Jaycees loved you Jack, and we thank you for everything. Rest in peace, God's faithful servant, after a job so very well done.

On September 7th, Book Club members gathered at Sandy's home to enjoy flatbread pizzas, sweet treats, and iced tea while discussing Hello Beautiful by Ann Napolitano, described as a homage to Louisa May Alcott's timeless classic, Little Women.


William Waters grew up in a house silenced by tragedy, where his parents could hardly bear to look at him, much less love him—so when he meets the spirited and ambitious Julia Padavano in his freshman year of college, it's as if the world has lit up around him. With Julia comes her family, as she and her three sisters are inseparable: Sylvie, the family's dreamer, is happiest with her nose in a book; Cecelia is a free-spirited artist; and Emeline patiently takes care of them all. With the Padavanos, William experiences a newfound contentment; every moment in their house is filled with loving chaos. But then darkness from William's past surfaces, jeopardizing not only Julia's carefully orchestrated plans for their future, but the sisters' unshakeable devotion to one another. The result is a catastrophic family rift that changes their lives for generations.

The novel gave us a lot to discuss: the complexity of Rose, the mother of the sisters, whose attitude toward her daughters was close-minded and created angst; the interesting personality of their father Charlie, who appeared well loved and admired by everyone except Rose; the tragic dysfunction of William's parents and how that damaged him; and the character development of each sister. We also made connections to "Little Women." There were some interesting aspects to the novel, but ultimately, many book club members found Julia's behavior unbelievable and frustrating.

Therefore, the book earned mostly 3's with one 2.5 and one 3.5 on our updated rating scale, which is as follows: 1 being "drop everything, turn off the phone, and read; no one should bother me until I am done; I might even be late for work or sunburned if reading outside; " 2 being "good, leave the phone on, recommend to my friends, not good enough to earn a 1 for a potential flaw, but worth reading"; 3 being "glad I bought it and read it, will talk to my book friends about it, but I am not recommending it to all my friends; 4 being "I regret paying money for the book, but it's tolerable if I didn't pay hard earned money for it"; and 5 being "I wish I had not read it and wasted precious hours of my life."

We discussed some potential book club titles for the December book selection: "Silent Patient," "Secret Life of Flora Lee," and Lisa C. shared "Just the Nicest Couple," "The Golden Spoon," and "Just Another Missing Person." Next month, bring additional titles for consideration.

October 5th Book Choice: "West With Giraffes" by Lynda Rutledge (not available on Libby, sadly)



An emotional, rousing novel inspired by the incredible true story of two giraffes who made headlines and won the hearts of Depression-era America.

"Few true friends have I known and two were giraffes..."

Woodrow Wilson Nickel, age 105, feels his life ebbing away. But when he learns giraffes are going extinct, he finds himself recalling the unforgettable experience he cannot take to his grave. It's 1938. The Great Depression lingers. Hitler is threatening Europe, and world-weary Americans long for wonder. They find it in two giraffes who miraculously survive a hurricane while crossing the Atlantic. What follows is a twelve-day road trip in a custom truck to deliver Southern California's first giraffes to the San Diego Zoo. Behind the wheel is the young Dust Bowl rowdy Woodrow. Inspired by true events, the tale weaves real-life figures

with fictional ones, including the world's first female zoo director, a crusty old man with a past, a young female photographer with a secret, and assorted reprobates as spotty as the giraffes.

Part adventure, part historical saga, and part coming-of-age love story, West with Giraffes explores what it means to be changed by the grace of animals, the kindness of strangers, the passing of time, and a story told before it's too late.

Book Choice for November 2nd: "Demon Copperhead" by Barbara Kingsolver.

Set in the mountains of southern Appalachia, *Demon Copperhead* is the story of a boy born to a teenaged single mother in a single-wide trailer, with no assets beyond his dead father's good looks and copper-colored hair, a



caustic wit, and a fierce talent for survival. Relayed in his own unsparing voice, Demon braves the modern perils of foster care, child labor, derelict schools, athletic success, addiction, disastrous loves, and crushing losses. Through all of it, he reckons with his own invisibility in a popular culture where even the superheroes have abandoned rural people in favor of generations ago, Charles Dickens wrote David Copperfield from his experience as a survivor of institutional poverty and its damages to children in his society. Those problems have yet to be solved in ours. Dickens is not a prerequisite for readers of this novel, but he provided its inspiration. In transposing a Victorian epic novel to the contemporary American South, Barbara Kingsolver enlists Dickens' anger and compassion, and above all, his faith in the transformative powers of a good story. Demon Copperhead speaks for a new generation of lost boys, and all those born into beautiful,

cursed places they can't imagine leaving behind.




New Project Ideas (Chairman needed)

Light up the Town – 11/25 Chair Needed:


Mr. and Mrs. Claus have been requested to make a visit again this year. Looking for someone to coordinate this effort.
